
Greetings from Western Massachusetts, we hope all is well with you and yours as we get ready to start this busy year. We have lots going on and some things that we have already done as well.

A Music Academy for Shrine Oriental Bands

The following article is an excerpt from a presentation made to the ASOB executive at the April 2013 mid-winter meeting at Sioux Falls, SD.

The concept was endorsed by the ASOB executive and will be presented to the nobility for further development.

The Oriental Band as a franchise has enjoyed many years of success by being the cornerstone of our ceremonials, the pride of our parades and of course the source of countless ribbings as the purveyor of "The Sweetest Sound of Music, this Side of Heaven".

The franchise however is under tremendous strain to hold on to the glory days of the years past. The negative outcomes of changing demographics are compounded by the following challenges:

1. Lack of Formal Training Programs and Venues for New Bandsmen

The traditional approach to training new band members has been to rely on the good will of fellow band members to master an instrument. Lacking the skills to train and teach others, this approach produces mixed results. In the areas of percussion the retention of new recruits enjoys a much higher success ratio than the wind instruments. Banging on a drum, crashing a pair of cymbals or shaking a tambourine may not be as daunting an effort in the quest to produce a note. The quality of the melody produced aside.

The musettes have always been a challenge to teach by their requirement for some rudimentary music reading ability as well as good finger dexterity. Teaching a new recruit to play the musette is not for the faint hearted. Due to the learning challenges presented by this instrument, the musette section has had a higher attrition rate for new recruits, than the other sections of the oriental bands. With the changing demographics we are experiencing some bands are critically short of musette players.

There is no bona-fide venue or teaching resources available, to support musical skill development for new band members. This lack of ability to having access to reliable training and development for new band recruits threatens the viability of a lot of bands.

2. Lack of development programs for band directors

The importance of the band director's position does not require a lengthy treatise on the subject. Repeating the obvious, a band director is expected to be the inspiring leader of the band. Structuring interesting band practices that keep the bandsmen coming back week after a week is a good skill to have. Helping these practices achieve success during competition is an added expectation we have of band directors.

Addressing the musical challenges of the band aside, the profiles of successful band directors reveal the need for such leadership attributes as: strong communication skills, strong organizational abilities, and a knack for handling conflict within the band when the occasion arises (interpersonal skills).

Despite the importance of the band director's position, there is no infrastructure in place for the development and growth of band directors in the realm of oriental bands. In most cases band directors inherit a position no one else wanted. Some are good at it from the beginning, some go through the motions, and some may become the source of negative energy.

The lack of support for the development of musical directing skills, as well as the interpersonal and leadership skills required in this position, is a constraint to the robust development of the Shrine Oriental Bands.

3. A repertory that has grown stale

The oriental band music repertory has been compromised over the years by the singular focus on competitions. The focus of what can be performed over a 12 minute span of performance has channeled the bands to develop a repertory of 8 minutes worth of musical numbers (the old stand-by's) supplanted by the competition song of the year. Occasionally the competition song supplants one of the numbers in the stand-by list. Most often it is relegated to the dust bin of history, if the band finds the musical number to be challenging.

The result for most bands is, the endless repetition of the same tunes year in and year out. Boredom is the rule of the day for most band practices in the realm.

4. Unrealized potential for higher fundraising revenues.

A limited repertory has limited entertainment value leading to limited fund raising potential beyond the portals of local Shrine Temples.

All Shrine Oriental Bands have the latent potential to become entertainment power houses by extending their repertory and showmanship skills, through the availability of appropriate training and development.

The realization of this potential can open the door for the bands to increase their contribution power to the Ladder of Smiles. A future of Oriental Band Shows/Show-Downs performed to a paying public is an exciting possibility worthy of pursuit.

A Music Academy for Shrine Oriental Bands

The time is right to open the narrow beam of competition focus by enabling the bands to perform a bigger repertory of good entertainment for public consumption, and the goal of increased fund raising ability for our Philanthropy.

The establishment of a Music Academy for Oriental Bands, taking place once a year for two and a half days, can serve as a renaissance to the realm of Shrine Oriental Bands. Capabilities imparted by such an education venue can ultimately enable the bands to increase their fund raising abilities through a broadened repertory of music supported by solid skills in music abilities and showmanship, and attract new members through their successful musical endeavors.

The Curriculum

The core of the curriculum to be offered by such an academy to focus on beginner, intermediate and advanced skill level instruction for wind and percussion instruments. The following elements can be additional parts of the curriculum without losing sight of the core music that distinguishes the Shrine Oriental Bands:

- New music to add to the repertory to help renew the current music offerings and provide the challenge and variety that is currently missing.
- Workshops for band directors focusing on music direction skills as well as leadership and inter-personal skills development.
- Provide appropriate teaching materials to band directors to help develop new band members' musical abilities throughout the year.
- Introduce new instruments to the bands (great possibilities for the percussion area) that can enhance the music being produced.
- Offer advanced music composition opportunities to those members seeking to reach a higher level. Oriental band music fusion with other types of music is a fertile field of opportunities for this type of learning.
- Provide the skills required for showmanship that leads to good entertainment.
- Explore new horizons by using music as a means to comedy.
- Introduce skills for the dancing genies (a great show potential that has all but disappeared).
- In addition to the skill development opportunities offered the academy can also be a catalyst for a major fund raising event featuring the bands. An exciting option would be to use the last half day of the Academy to host a Music Festival or a Show-Down of the Bands in front of an admission paid public audience. The audience can even be offered the chance to pick the winners in the various categories.

The Faculty

The faculty for the Academy can be chosen from the current pool of bandsmen though a selection process to be developed. There is a choice on how the faculty can obtain and enhance their skills to teach, as well as prepare the academy curricula

- **A.** A onetime training course that by a panel of professional educators, for a onetime fee.
- **B.** Initial training and on-going support provided by the faculty of a music institution of some renown, by the establishment of a partnership agreement with Shriners International. This partnership can be similar to the ones being fashioned between our Hospitals and various institutions of higher learning. The institution benefits from exposure as a contributor to the philanthropy, the faculty and bands benefit through access to high quality guidance and mentorship.

Either choice depends on qualified Oriental Band members having the opportunity to take on new challenges for the benefit of their own personal development in particular and our Philanthropy in general.

Location Choices

Choices exist on how the Academy can be brought to existence. The following options may be considered as part of its founding:

A brick and mortar venue anchored in one of the Shrine Temples. A further choice can be to have two such venues one being in the East and one in the West, with the same faculty serving both.

Have the Academy held in various Shrine Temples through a bidding process.

Establish the Academy in a resort location where the instruction can be had in a retreat environment, with the availability of a suitable venue for the graduation performance. Other choices may also be considered.

Time Line to Fruition

From the enrolment of all stakeholders, to the identification of faculty, and the achievement of all steps described herein may take up to three years. The interim period can see the launch of workshops that may be held during the annual Imperial sessions, and other regional meetings to work on workshop format and hone faculty skills.

Moving Forward - The Road Ahead

If this vision were to become reality, its success will depend on:

- **A.** A solid project plan for the official launch of the Academy with a defined date for the opening ceremonies.
- **B.** A comprehensive communication strategy engaging all stakeholders.

A solid plan aside, the extent to which all stakeholder feel they have participated in putting the virtual bricks of this project together, will dictate the extent of the success of this project.

The stakeholders to be engaged are:

- 1. ASOB member bands
- 2. ASOB executive
- 3. Regional Shrine Associations and through them the individual Temples of each jurisdiction.

The Shrine Temples in particular are the most important stakeholders. A healthy partnership with each temple for the road ahead will help cement the appreciation, of the fundraising and new member recruitment potential, of a vibrant band for their respective Temples.

In conclusion the data points discussed above make a compelling case for the establishment of a Music Academy for Shrine Oriental Bands. Fellow dreamers are invited to come aboard this exciting endeavor to put their own mark on this project, toward the dawn of a renaissance period for all the Shrine Oriental Bands and the benefit of our Philanthropy.

Fantasy Rules and Regulations

(Revised July 2008)

Any band desiring to appear in the A.S.O.B. Fantasy shall notify the Chairman of the Fantasy Committee by mail. A form is furnished for this purpose. Please indicate whether the Band will appear in the Stage Presentation, the Parade or both, and indicate the number of bandsmen who will be performing. Additionally please indicate if the band desires to compete for awards, as it is permissible to appear for exhibition only. Bands appearing for exhibition only will receive Judge's Sheets for their performance review, but the exhibition scores will not be included in the Fantasy competition.

For those bands wishing to compete in the Fantasy (Stage Performance, Parade or both), there will be a registration fee of \$2.00 per member, payable either in advance or during the Music Director's Meeting. Registration for the Fantasy and Parade competition will be open through the Director's Meeting. To be eligible to perform all Bands must register prior to the conclusion of the Director's Meeting. All bandsmen appearing in the performance are counted as A.S.O.B. members in good standing. The number of performing bandsmen cannot be more than the number of current A.S.O.B. dues members for a band. The A.S.O.B. Secretary/Treasurer will confirm that the number of performing members is equal or less than a band's current A.S.O.B. membership total. Should a discrepancy occur regarding the number of performing members, a band can make payment for current dues to the A.S.O.B. Secretary Treasurer at the Music Director's Meeting to correct this situation. Performance Class assignment will be made at the Director's Meeting based on the number of bands and the number of performing bandsmen in each band. After the class assignment is announced, a drawing to determine the order of appearance within each classification for the Stage Presentation and Parade will occur. One number will be drawn by lot for each band in their respective classification. Once the Music Director's Meeting is over, no changes to the classification or order of appearance will be allowed.

Judging will be based for stage performance and parade as follows:

There will be a Best Oriental Band trophy awarded to the Band who has the highest overall point accumulation for the Fantasy and Parade. First and Second Place trophies for Fantasy and Parade will be awarded based on the highest and next to highest score for a category. A Caliphs trophy for the most outstanding Music Director will be awarded at the discretion of the Caliphs.

The Concert Number will appear in issues of the Na Khabar and all bands are required to play it. It shall be the closing number of each presentation. Arrangements and/or embellishments to the theme can be at the discretion of the band, and they may be as elaborate as they wish.

Each band shall have warm-up numbers WHICH MUST BE OF ORIENTAL MOTIF before presentation of the Concert Number. However, the band must remain on stage at least eight (8) minutes and not to exceed twelve (12) minutes. There will be a loss of five (5) points per minute (or fraction thereof) for any over/under time. Time will commence following the announcement of the band by the M.C. and the first sound made by a band member whether it is spoken, sung or played by an instrument. If the competing band elects its own introduction, entrance or other opening spectacle, time will run from the commencement of such activity. Personal microphones are not permissible and if used, that band will be disqualified. Pyrotechnics will be permitted.

All music played by competing bands including warm-up numbers must be of Oriental motif. There will be an automatic five (5) point penalty for any visible music used during Fantasy/Parade competition. There can be limited solo presentation not to exceed one (1) minute. Failure to comply will result in disqualification. The same solo rule applies to music played at the point of Parade judging which is designated by appropriate street signs.

Make-up: Beards should look authentic and make-up when used shall be applied so that the resulting character is believable.

Costumes: Bands are asked to be appropriately dressed in Oriental and Mid-East motif-type costumes; however, due to political climates and concerns for showing respect for our military, bands may wear non Oriental or Mid-East costumes as long as the band's costumes are uniform. As an example, points would be taken away if a band had members in unit shirts and slacks and other members in Oriental or Mid-East costumes. As long as a band has a uniform look, judging will not be reduced. Neatness should be considered.


Showmanship: This is the flourish and enthusiasm shown by all members and the originality of performance and presentation.

Overall Music Presentation: Playing ability, music of Oriental motif, and arrangement will be highly considered. Continued playing ability will be most important in Parade and concert.

Judging: Will be made up of impartial judges who have knowledge about musical, theatrical, marching, showmanship and costuming. Judges will be briefed by selected member of the Fantasy Committee and their will be no identification worn such as name tag, fez or other types of Shrine Center identification at this briefing.

Float Design: Must be of Oriental Motif, indicative of Oriental Bands.

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
